## 2ND SEMESTER COMPETITIONS: THE EXPERIENCE


The second semester of this school year has been incredibly fun and filled with academic competitions. So far, we have participated in 3 competitions, namely SASMO, WMI, and WSC. Let's delve into the actual experience:

### SASMO

The Singapore and Asian Schools Math Olympiad is a mathematics competition from Singapore. SASMO 2023 was held online at a Zoom meeting on the 31st of March. The contestants can be seen tense throughout the competition. The organizers provided multiple breakout rooms, one room for each grade. We had one and a half hours to answer 15 multiple-choice questions (negative points for wrong answers!) and 10 fill-in-the-blanks. Overall, the questions tested our thinking skills and problem-solving capabilities. It teaches us to find a new approach to solve questions instead of relying on simple equations. The top 40% of participants will get the chance to join the SIMOC competition to be held in Singapore.

### WMI

The World Mathematics Invitational (or WMI for short) was held at Saint Peter's Christian School, Kelapa Gading on the 1st of April, 2023. The atmosphere was tense; we all felt the pressure and urge to win since the stakes were high. This math competition had lots of participants, ranging from kindergarten to senior high school. Of course, the venue was filled with eager students, but we were all placed into groups and placed into separate classrooms in the school. Participants who earned either gold, silver, or bronze medals will have the chance to attend the WMI global finals in South Korea.




We were given 1.5 hours to complete two papers. Paper one consisted of 20 (in my opinion) relatively easy multiple-choice questions and five challenging ones. Paper 2 consisted of 20 multiple-choice questions. Even though we had options to choose from, it was still very hard to solve or even guess. We could only wait and hope until our results came out.

### WSC



The World Scholars' Cup is a competition for a variety of topics, and the first day was held at Sekolah Penabur Kelapa Gading, May 6th for Seniors/May 7th for Juniors. We endured a month of hard work and studying for this moment. Collaborative writing was first, where scholars had to decide between 6 topics provided and their own style of writing. Next up was the very challenging scholars challenge (hal!) which consisted of 120 MCQs with only 60 minutes to complete it. After a break, we instantly headed back for our 3-round-long debates (our last event for the day!). We all had 15 minutes to research our motion, followed by 3-4 minutes to speak for each speaker.

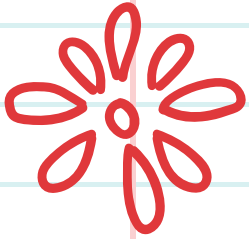


The second day was held at Ciputra Artpreneur for both divisions. We had the scholar's bowl - an event where we got to simultaneously answer multiple choice questions displayed on the big screen using a clicker provided. As the bowl concluded (marking the end of all academic events), scholars got to show their talents and skills in the debate showcase and Scholars' show as an intermezzo before the long-awaited agenda of the day - the awarding ceremony. Many scholars joyfully screamed as they received their awards, you could only imagine the crazy atmosphere! After the really long awarding ceremony, the contestants finally said farewell to the WSC saga as winners!

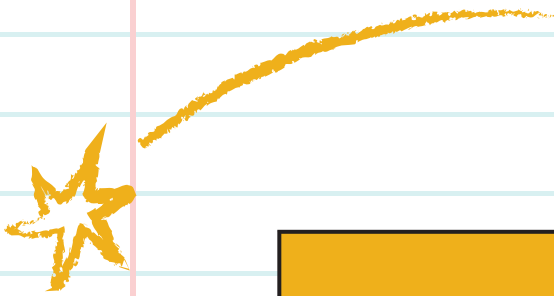
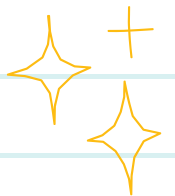

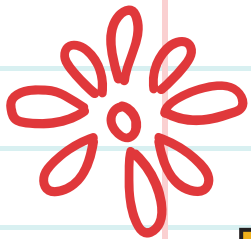

Congratulations, class of 2023! You deserve to have fun this prom season!



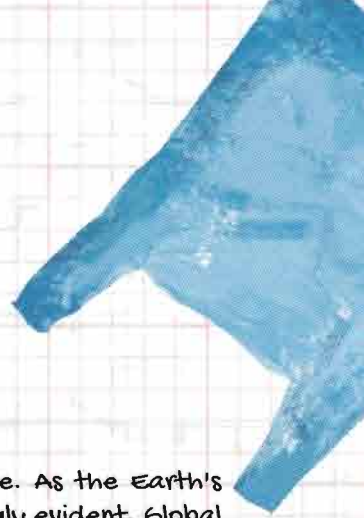

# GLOBAL WARMING

## A Burning Issue



Global warming has been proven to be one of the most critical challenges of our time. As the Earth's temperature continues to rise due to human activities, the effects are becoming increasingly evident. Global warming is caused by human activities which emit greenhouse gasses into the atmosphere, causing an increase in the Earth's average temperature. Such human activities include burning of fossil fuels, deforestation, and agricultural practices. The effects of global warming pose a significant risk to the environment, ecosystems, and human well-being, such as rising sea levels, scarcity of water, more frequent and severe droughts and floods, as well as loss of biodiversity. Our welfare, shelter and food are all continuously threatened by rising global temperatures.

In Jakarta, the sea level is rising at an alarming rate of approximately 2 and a half centimeters a year, which is more than twice the global average for coastal megacities. On the topic of the sea, rising sea temperatures have led to severe coral bleaching in some of the reefs off the islands of Sulawesi and Bali that are home to exotic fishes.

Furthermore, as deforestation increases, it will only get worse! According to the Ministry of Environmental and Forestry, Indonesia lost over 115,400 hectares of forest cover in 2020, an area 3 times bigger than Los Angeles.

As students in this generation, we have an opportunity to make a difference in this relentless battle against global warming. Here are some ways on how we can do our part and help tackle this issue:

### 1. Raise Awareness

By educating ourselves, friends, and family members, we can encourage others to act and take meaningful action.

### 2. Reduce, Reuse and Recycle

By using the 3R principles (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle), we would be able to reduce our carbon footprint. Albeit small, these practices help save resources, decrease energy consumption, and minimize greenhouse gas emissions.

The use of money has been around for several hundreds of years, from coins in China at 1000 BCE to the invention of paper money in the United States at 1690 AD. Down the line, credit/debit cards were invented but later lost their popularity because of their inconveniences. Recently, after the pandemic occurred, there was a form of money used more preferably to perform transactions with only electronic devices, which is known as QRIS (Quick Response Code Indonesian Standard). Plenty of shops nowadays do not accept cash as payment anymore to reduce the use of physical contact with each other. 
In Aiden's opinion, QRIS is more convenient than cash. He prefers to carry his phone over his wallet because of its increased features and portability.

Megan gains from QRIS by having the freedom to top off her account balance whenever and wherever she wants. Since she can use her phone to make all of her purchases at stores, she finds it convenient.


Anjarico, on the other hand, favors making payments in cash. He likes the tangible quality of currency and thinks it provides a sense of security. In emergency scenarios, such as when his phone's battery runs out, he also recognizes the benefit of carrying his wallet with him.





Ms. Sheryl prefers QRIS because of its practicality. She enjoys how quickly QRIS payments are made, how manually counting money is eliminated, and how simple it is to check account balances and spending using an app. She also believes that QRIS is safer than cash since it lessens the possibility of fraud and calculating errors brought on by human mistakes during manual exchanges.

According to the responses we have obtained, the vast majority of people prefer utilizing QRIS as their preferred payment option. Significant benefits of QRIS include easier expense tracking, quicker transactions, and improved convenience and mobility. However, it's crucial to be cautious and keep our wallets on us at all times as a backup in case of unplanned crises. Alternative payment methods can be needed in instances like a dead phone battery or locations without dependable internet access. Additionally, it's important to keep in mind that not all stores or restaurants may have QRIS installed for payments; thus, in some circumstances, carrying cash or a physical payment option is still advisable. By being aware of these factors, people can strike a balance between the QRIS' ease and being ready for unforeseen circumstances.

# English A, One Last Time



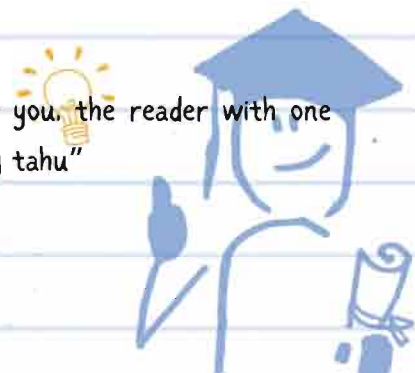

# Science Day, Fun Day!

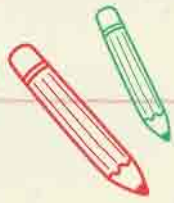

Moving on to the 9th grade, students embark on a tower-building quest using uncooked spaghetti, toothpicks, and styrofoam balls. This activity challenges their engineering skills as they strive to construct the tallest and most stable tower. Additionally, students are also tasked with creating accessories from recyclable materials like paper and plastic, further emphasizing the importance of sustainability.

To culminate the day's events, the 9th-grade students eagerly immerse themselves in a science-themed escape room prepared by the 11th-grade students. This interactive experience combines scientific knowledge with problem-solving, creating an engaging and thrilling challenge for the participants.
