Students of Grade 10 were sitting for the aptitude and IQ (Intelligence Quotient) test, nervous and expectant. How could we not be when we know that the results of this assessment will play a vital role in our future career choices? Although its results do not tie us down, it will still contribute significantly as a recommendation to our future; as a stepping stone in deciding our career paths.
