Through her determination, she successfully opened six all-girls' schools across the island of Java, notably naming them 'Kartini Schools'.

THE REVOLUTION IN SCIENCE @scienceday

Happy Birthday to our planet, Earth! You must be suffering, but we promise to put in the effort to take care of you. Hang on for just a little longer.

This year, BTB School held its Science Day on April 23rd, coincidentally the day after Earth Day. Global goals nowadays are everything for a 'brighter future.' So it's only obvious that the theme for this year was: 'Science: Innovating Solutions for a Better Tomorrow.'

The teachers have decided to add something unique to this year's edition, with our two activities being 'BTB Spectra Fest' and 'BTB Shark Tank.' While the activities were announced before the Lebaran break, preparations and efforts did not cease during the holidays.

The day started with a lively opening ceremony, with our school principal, Ms. Paul, emphasizing the significance human actions towards our environment. The opening ceremony then transitioned into an Earth Day presentation, which included a video about the history of plastic and a short speech by Cordy (9 Curie) addressing pollution - the giant elephant in the room - and advocating for replacing single-use plastic for the better. All students from grades 9 and 11 then transitioned into their respective classes, preparing for the day's activities.

For the Spectra Fest, each class of Grade 9 and Grade 11 was asked to pick two fun experiments engaging) highlight the importance of science and prove that science can be enjoyable with simple materials. Examples of physics experiments include demonstrations of string telephones, singing wine glasses, and flying pipes; while examples chemistry experiments include elephant toothpaste, self-inflating balloons, and natural indicators. Additionally, there were experiments involving biology.



Having our own version of Shark Tank ignited the creative and innovative spirit in everyone, where every class had to propose an idea or prototype supported by a scientific hypothesis. Long story short, every class presented their own proposals: a magnetic levitation bridge by 9 Curie; replacing car fuel with water by 9 Darwin; creating synthetic diamonds out of carbon dioxide by 9 Einstein; using coconut husks to make eco-friendly packaging by 9 Newton; an application that integrates with a smart voice assistant to track and guide a person's lifestyle by 11 Curie; eco-friendly air fresheners made from fruit peels by 11 Einstein; and stone paper that is waterproof and tear-resistant by 11 Newton.

WAISAK CELEBRATION: Birth of a Teaching

Waisak is a day celebrated by many Buddhists around the world. The way it is celebrated varies across countries, particularly in Asian nations, but it typically occurs on the first full moon of the ancient lunar month of Vesakha, falling in May or early June. Why is celebrating Waisak Day significant to Buddhists? How is it celebrated? And can followers of other religions participate in this celebration?

History

Waisak Day commemorates the birth of the founder of Buddhist teachings, Prince Siddhartha Gautama, or the Buddha. Legend has it that his mother gave birth while standing, and upon his birth, the prince took his first seven steps, with a lotus blooming with each step. Though isolated from the outside world by his father, the prince ventured out in a carriage around the city, where he encountered sights of old age, sickness, and death. Despite these encounters, he observed a monk who remained calm amid the suffering around him, sparking his curiosity. He then secretly left the palace, embarking on a journey where he learned various teachings and eventually attained "nirvana" - the state of enlightenment characterized by peace and happiness. Along the way, he imparted many teachings, known as the "Dharmma," but he tragically passed away in a state of parinirvana, where he did not reincarnate into this world again.

How do we celebrate Waisak Day?

Different countries have different ways of celebrating this day. In Indonesia, we celebrate it by "bathing" the Buddha, an event believed to purify the hearts and minds of people. Other practices include eating vegetarian foods for a day, visiting temples, or participating in meditation to commemorate Waisak Day. Monks bottle holy water and transport flames using candles. They also participate in the "Pindapata," an event where people offer food to the monks.

Can other religions celebrate Waisak Day?

Certainly! In fact, Buddhism was first recorded in India, where the majority of citizens are part of Hindu culture. Just because we have different religions does not mean we cannot celebrate it. In Sri Lanka, many people still celebrate this day even though their country is home to many different religions.
